# Richie Stratton


If you make your way around Portland's strip club scene, Richie Stratton is sure to be a familiar face. You can find him hosting Sinferno Cabaret at Dante's on Sunday nights, Kit Kat Showclub on Wednesdays and Fridays, and co-hosting alongside the lovely Axel at the *Polerotica* and *Miss Exotic* Oregon finals. Beyond his gift for hosting events with a fun and entertaining stage presence, Richie is a creative multi-hyphenate with talents that include screenwriting, a 20-year-and-running career in stand-up comedy, and most recently, creating and self-publishing a comic book alongside cowriter Aaron Wagner and illustrator Marcus Lake.

His comic book series, Night of the Were-*Elk*, found its inspiration in that very crash. The result is a truly unique and wonderfully weird offering to the world of comics.



Set in a small town in the Pacific Northwest, Night of the Were-Elk centers around Tiffany, a trailer park dweller who staves off loneliness in the company of bar flies and truckers who are just passing through. Following one such encounter, Tiffany unwittingly finds herself caught in the sights of a menacing secret society. Equal parts mur-



der mystery and supernatural thriller, Night of the Were-Elk is a fun and exciting read. Richie was gracious enough to grant me access to a script that lays out the comic's


full story arc, and I'm pretty excited for the release of future issues.

On that subject, the first two issues are already available, with #3 set to release sometime in August or September, and subsequent books releasing every two months or so after that (there's no definite release schedule in place; Richie assures me it's best to give Lake the space he needs to work his visual magic). If you're interested in picking up a copy, head to crawlinkcomics.com, where you can directly purchase physical or digital copies, or find a map of comic book stores throughout Portland that carry the book (of which there were nine last I checked), and a couple of which have sold out and re-upped on their stock.

So, what's in Richie's future beyond Night of the Were-Elk? Remember when I mentioned that one of Richie's talents includes screenwriting? Well, he has two short films being shown at this year's Guignolfest, a film contest and festival of short horror films, in Portland. He and Wagner also recently collaborated on a screenplay for a buddy comedy, mashing up two of exactly nobody's favorite movies, resulting in the once-again-wonderfully-weird Paul Blart: Timecop. No word on whether they've successfully attached Kevin James and Jean-Claude Van Damme to reprise their respective roles, but I've got my fingers crossed!

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


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
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




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# HOWPEOPLESTAYED GOOLINTHE "OLD DAYS"



## A Bouncer's Crash Course in Philosophy

# Vol. 2: Plato



All right, kids, class is back in session. Last month, I began this philosophy crash course with a selection of teachings from Socrates. Among the students who sat and learned from Socrates, aside from Bill and Ted, was Plato, whose name has become synonymous with republics and friends who don't fuck. But I'm not here to teach you about republics or platonic friendships—I'm sure you can figure that stuff out on your own. I'm teaching you about philosophy, which it just so happens is another thing Plato is known for. Let's dig in, shall we?

#### "Human behavior flows from three main sources: desire, emotion, and

knowledge." Understanding the motivations behind somebody's behavior is a handy tool in the bouncer's toolbox. I recently read a really good academic paper on the subject, titled "Behavioral Indicators of Motives for Barroom Aggression: Implications for Preventing Bar Violence." The paper is available to read for free on the National Library of Medicine's PubMed Central website, and I'd recommend that anyone working in nightlife give it a read. The authors of the study sent observation teams into 118 large-capacity bars in Toronto between midnight and 3 a.m. to document instances of aggression in a barroom setting. They identified four main causes of aggression: compliance, grievance/justice, social identity, and fun/excitement, all of which—one could argue have their roots in Plato's list of desire, emotion, and knowledge. The study offers strategies for dealing with aggressive acts based on each of the four motives they list in the paper, and that's the point I'm getting at. If you're able to deduce what's driving someone's problematic behavior, you'll have a better idea of how to address those actions.

and noblest of all victories." Having some level of control over oneself is important in bouncer work; control over things like vices and emotions. The more you lack control over your emotions, the more easily an unruly patron can provoke you into an unnecessary, violent confrontation that makes you look like the aggressor. The more you lack control over your vices, the more those vices will distract you from your job, whether it be drinking, drugs, or video crack—ahem—l mean video lottery. In both cases, failure to conquer yourself erodes your ability to perform good security work effectively and has the potential to get you fired—or worse.

#### "The empty vessel makes the loudest

sound." This one is true both philosophically and scientifically. I won't get too deep into a science lesson save to say the contents of a full vessel dampen the vessel's ability to propagate resonant vibrations. Philosophically, it's like this: if someone at work comes to me with a security issue, that's a good thing. It's what I'm there for. My roommate Jack is constantly reminding me that "you're judged by the company you keep." I've also heard it said that if you're the smartest person in the room, you're in the wrong room. I'm



not sure where that one originated, but it's been attributed to Confucius, Marissa Mayer, and Lorne Michaels. Whoever actually said it first, these sayings all mean the same thing: be selective of who you keep around. Don't give shitty people occasion to drag you down with them.

"When men speak ill of thee, live so as nobody may believe them." Deprive your haters of ammunition against you. Deny them a leg to stand on when they try to undermine you. Mind you, Plato is talking about reality here, not appearance. Be an upstanding person; don't just make an effort to appear that way. You'll eventually be discovered if you're fake. Videos I see on social media of content creators like Mr. Beast, who do incredibly kind things for other people, but they do these things while sticking cameras in the faces of the victims of their kindness so they can show the world what wonderful people they are, in hopes of generating



likes or shares or clicks or whatever other stupid social media metrics they're trying to pump up—stunts like that ring hollow to me. A real act of kindness doesn't need that kind of exposure. Doing the right thing should be its own reward. If that isn't the case for you, you might just be kind of a piece of shit.

No matter how much David Lee Roth insists that it was a safety precaution to make sure that stagehands were reading their contracts thoroughly, I call bullshit. Still, I get the importance of stagehands carefully reading the details in a contract for a show involving multiple pyrotechnics. However, for a studio session that involves only vocals, I can't imagine why it would be important for the engineers to read the fine print. The "talent" shows up, whines into a microphone with headphones on, then leaves. The walls are often padded, too, for soundproofing, so I'm not sure what injuries are even possible. Still, this unnamed diva demanded not only a bowl of white M&M's but also vases full of white roses in every room, white curtains hung on every surface she'd have to look at, and all the furniture would have to be white. The label would pay for everything, so it's not like it cost the studio anything other than the hassle of going out and buying an absurd amount of M&M's and white roses. The engineer who told me this story was luckily able to borrow some white leather chairs from a friend and threw a white sheet over the couch in the sound room (fortunately, the diva didn't notice). As stated before, the session lasted only an hour, and the singer left with only part of a vocal take. The engineer didn't remember the pop star even touching the bowl of all-white M&M's. If you think I'm making this up, look up the ultrawealthy's obsession with white interior design. It checks out. Ultimately, the only downside to this demand was that a *bunch* of white roses were just thrown in the trash. They kept the M&M's (the non-white ones, too), which will likely last the studio staff till the end of time.



#### The Party Bus(es)

Different studio, different engineer, same awful city. If you haven't guessed, all these stories take place in Los Angeles. This one involves a band in the mid-'80s. The band in question was signed and well-known in the underground circuit but not the worldwide sensation they'd become in the early '90s. They hit up the studio to set up a week of blockout time. So far, nothing out of the ordinary. On the start date, naturally, there was no band in sight at the agreed-upon start time. Finally, several hours later, a tour bus arrives with the band, some equipment, and a slew of groupies and hangers-on. The band and their entourage poured into the studio and, from what I heard, didn't seem too worried about the late start. The first item of business was to break out the multiple cases of beer they brought with them and pour out lines of blow on the control room's coffee table. Some folks in the band did plug in and start jamming away, but it seemed to be more for

the entertainment of the entourage than for laying anything to tape. The engineer assumed that maybe this was going to be the studio musicians who would actually play everything, along with the rest of the equipment. No such luck. This second bus was just more groupies and drug dealers coming to join the party. Apparently, some stuff was recorded at this session that made it on the album.

If there's any lesson to be learned from these stories thus far, it's to get signed immediately since record labels seem to have endless money to throw at emotionally stunted artists.

#### **The Missed Connection**

By far, my favorite story I've heard, once again, takes place in Los Angeles. This time, the artist in question wasn't making ridiculous demands or acting a fool in the studio, not taking the time seriously. From everything I heard, the sessions themselves were productive enough. The artist was laying her parts down, treated the staff well, and was doing the normal amount of cocaine while listening to takes in the control room. The only thing that the engineer noticed was amiss was that the artist always seemed to nervously check her phone, and when she took calls, she did them in private. The session ended, and the artist left. The engineer, as they're often expected to, stayed after hours to do some rough mixes to send to the label. Turns out it was two Russian gangsters with Glocks drawn and pointed straight at him. Although the artist was doing the normal amount of cocaine, it turns out she wasn't paying for it. The engineer who told me this story is still alive, so clearly, the Russians believed him when he said they just missed her. Famous people don't exactly give out their number, so he couldn't help the gentlemen get in touch anyway. I never heard if those poor Russian gangsters got the drug money that the pop star owed them.
